

MEMORIES OF CHAPEL

Chapel School Opens January 6, 1893

he formal opening of Chapel
Street School was held on Friday,
the 6th of January, 1893 at 2:00
p.m. The teaching staff consisted
of: Miss Whitelaw (Snapping Black Eyes),
Miss A. Carrier, Miss N. Clarkson and Miss
McLaughlin (Principal). The Inspector was
Mr. Carlyle. Miss McLaughlin rang a bell to
call school to order and at recess. An efficient, solid strap was kept as a practical feature of discipline.

Chapel School derived its name from Chapel Street. In 1836, a Baptist Chapel was built on the southeast corner of Chapel and Dundas on land donated by Deacon Archibald Burtch. The church was later demolished by a fire. This was after the Congregation had built and moved into what is now the First Baptist Church on Adelaide Street. The congregation of what is now Old St. Paul's Church, used the chapel for a time before building across the street.

The following are excerpts from articles and memoirs written about Chapel School. The authors of these excerpts are shown where such information was available.

Easter 1926

Mrs. Laura MacKay (Turner) began Chapel, Easter 1926 at age 6. One could begin any time they wished during the year. She came to school, a year earlier at age 5; the teacher asked her to spell cat. Because she was unable to do this, the teacher slapped her; therefore her mother kept her home another year.

1937

One day at recess in September 1937, we heard a noise; looking skyward, we saw our first large two engine aeroplane. It was quite a sight! All impressed.

ate 1930's
As Miss Masters, I taught Grade 2 at the School from September 1938 to January 1941, when I left to join the Inspection Board of the United Kingdom and

Canada during WW II.

Our staff consisted of Mr. Frank Hogg, Principal and Grade 6 teacher; Miss Anna Grant, Kindergarten; Miss Betty Painter (?), Grade 1; Miss Margaret Masters (myself) Grade 2, all with classrooms on the ground floor, while upstairs Grade 3, 4 and 5 were taught in 2 rooms by Miss Anne Irwin and Miss Freda Conn. Mr. Hogg and I had our classes in the "new addition" on the east side, then a one storey extension...

During this time, two events occurred that remain prominent in my mind. The first was the visit of Their Majesties King George VI and His Consort Queen Elizabeth to Woodstock on their Royal Tour in the spring of 1939. The arrangements were that Their Majesties would arrive on the Royal Train at the station and would remain there and not tour the City. Areas around the station were allotted to all city schools and many county schools. Chapel School was very fortunate as we were given a choice spot just east of the station platform and fairly close to the track...

The press train arrived a few minutes before the Royal Train. As it came to a halt immediately in front of our school, a Mountie, resplendent in his uniform with the red jacket, stepped off the train. Bobby, one of my more excitable students, dashed away from our area and before I could stop him reached the Mountie and shouted "Hi King! We are glad to see ya. We know all about you!" and offered his hand for a hand shake. (We had pictures in the classroom showing King George in his official military uniform wearing a red jacket.)... When the King did arrive Bobby refused to look at him, protesting he had already seen...him.

"Shirley Temple" Spotted in Woodstock

The other event was the production of the light opera "Folderol" which the Chapel Home and School Club sponsored. This was a very active club at that time. We staged Folderol in the auditorium of the Woodstock Collegiate Institute. Mr. Hogg was the Director and I accompanied on the piano. Our entire staff was very much involved as well as the Club Members in the production. I remember Shirley Marks, one of my Grade 2 pupils, a good little tap dancer. I sometimes played the music for her as she danced at various affairs in the city. With her blonde curls she resembled Shirley Temple. danced in the operetta and I remember practicing with her and also the chorus numbers when we attempted to have a whole line of chorus dancers on stage. Even though it was a lot of hard work with practices evening after evening, everyone seemed to enjoy the "togetherness" of the school, its staff and parents in this production.

Such are a few of my memories of Chapel School.

1942

At a school assembly, there was a spelling competition. I won a \$5.00 Canada War Bond.

June 22, 1943

Chapel Home & School Association was responsible for having an outing yesterday afternoon. After recess, school pupils marched to Southside Park; ball games and sports programs were enjoyed.

September 1944

In an impressive ceremony last evening at Chapel School, tribute was paid to 187 former pupils now serving in the active forces, when an honour roll was unveiled by Rev. John Morris. Mrs. H. Hewitt read the names on the roll, Mr. Morris giving those who have paid the supreme sacrifice. A minute's silence was observed in memory of these boys: Thomas

Best, Donald Bier, Joseph Dukes, Kenneth Hambly, Bill Irwin, William Nixon, Joe Weatley and Raymond Wilsdon.

The brief memorial service finished with "Taps" played by Ronald Drake, the national anthem, the war vesper and the benediction by Mr. Morris. Magistrate L. M. Ball was the special speaker and Mr. Douglas Drake, President of the Home & School Association presided. Miss M. Matheson of the staff was responsible for the beautiful printing on the honour roll. Mrs. Hendershott was in charge of the program. Assisting in the unveiling were 2 pupils, Billy Tilford and Gary Patterson.

1950's

In the 1950's, Mr. Whyley was custodian and like Mr. Jamieson was very conscientious. In the winter the girls smoothed the snow out for a slide and then carried water in their mouths from the fountains to flood the slides. After recess, Mr. Whyley would sprinkle ashes on the slide so the girls would have to make another one.

Eleanor Lampman, Marion (Lampman) Mathews and Harold Lampman

1975-1981

The leaky basement of the school resulted in our bean bags for physical education actually sprouting. The gym and stage were also in the basement. The stage had a low unintimidating platform on which students performed monthly assemblies without having to shout.






















