Mr. Corp carried on until May 1, 1940, when Clarence C. Wettlaufer became the new owner, the membership then being 190.

Since purchasing the business, Mr. Wettlaufer has considerably increased the volume of business, and has had to erect a large warehouse to accommodate the handling of feeds and poultry supplies. The business increased to such an extent it was found necessary to put trucks on the road for the benefit of the producers.

The woollen industry in Tavistock dates back to 1868, and it was in 1877 that the late J. G. Field took over the present mill, then a small concern. In the earlier days the mill produced tweeds, woollens, blankets, coverlets, etc., but during World War I the mill changed over to the exclusive manufacture of woollen socks, which it has continued since. In 1919, Mr. Field's son, James V. Field became partner in the business, and the firm name was changed to J. G. Field & Son. Continually expanding, the product of the mill is now known from coast to coast. Some years after the death of Mr. Field Sr., the business was disposed of, and is now known as J. G. Field & Son, Limited.
